Jiri Weiss takes the tragedy of the Bard's lovelorn couple and plays it out during the Nazi occupation of Czechoslovakia where a young student living in Prague hides a Jewish girl in his apartment building. He is her only link to the outside world. When the two are discovered by Pavel's mother the residents of the apartment building have to decide whether Hana can remain.

Shot in a haunting scheme of black and white with Welles himself, with his distinct baritone and grandiose theatrical zeal, essaying the role of the Moor and with a stellar cast that includes thespians of both stage and screen, 'Othello' is both definitive Shakespeare and a cinema classic. The Finnish master of drollery and minimalism, Aki Kaurismaki plays Hamlet like ballad full of the blues and sets it in the deceitful corporate corridors of a rubber duck factory in Finland. Finnish comic Pirkka-Pekka Petelius plays an irresponsible playboy who finds himself involved in a vicious boardroom power struggle with his uncle, who plans to sell off his company's assets in order to corner the market on Swedish rubber ducks. Tragedy turns into farce as Kaurismaki ridicules and satirizes corporate greed and proves without a doubt that as long as the human drama perpetuates itself, Shakespeare is here to stay.
