About Exhibition

While a battery of journalists, photographers and documentary filmmakers descended on Ahmadabad from across the country and abroad to cover the starting of the historic 'Salt March' of Mahatma Gandhi on March 12, 1930, a 27 year old artist Chhaganlal Jadav armed with a drawing book and pencil legged along the 242-mile route to Dandi, on the coast of the Arabian sea in South Gujarat, capturing the landmark satyagraha movement that shook the British empire.

Unknown to the world, the artist Chhaganlal Jadav's drawing book is a live pictorial documentary of the salt satyagraha movement from its beginning to its finale. 85 years later, Ahmadabad based historian Dr. Rizwan Kadri found these sketches gathering dust at 607 years old Gujari flea market on the Sabarmati river bank.

Artist Chhaganlal Jadav was a member of a group, called 'Arunodaya Tukdi' that had travelled in advance of the March and organized Bapu's journey. He found time to draw a few scenes and he painted 6 memorable poses of Gandhiji. He has also drawn other national leaders as well. He even took autographs on some for remembrance. In 'Karadi Shibir' Chhaganlal had the fortune to be with Gandhiji and here he made too few drawings. When on 5th May, 1930, Gandhiji was arrested. Along with him, Chhaganlal too was sentenced to 3 months prison. During these months he drew daily life in Nasik prison, state of the prisoners, different parts of the jail, in his drawingbook. This drawingbook is thus a rare collection of drawings and a live document of the historical Dandi March. These drawings and paintings which Chhaganlal made during the Dandi March - a great historical event has never been revealed to the world!!

The journey, covering 240 miles took 12 night halts and was witnessed to the breaking of the British law for salt. At that time, a veritable ocean of people had been drawn to this march, making it one of the largest mass movements of the world. A large number of media persons and artists from across the world were also drawn to this event. An unsung Satyagrahi and artist Chhaganlal Jadav, in his tiny drawing book, had captured some known/unknown faces from amongst the participants of this epic journey towards Swaraj.

I am extremely happy to share these landmark drawings that are part of our living history. They are presently a part of the personal collection of the Dr. Rizwan Kadri from Ahmadabad, who brought these drawings to light and shared them with us for purpose of showcasing them for the first time, through this exhibition. This event is also part of the year-long celebrations of the 150th birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi - Father of the Nation, to propagate his message of peace. This exhibition of drawings has also triggered an opportunity for NGMA to bring on view the works of Indian masters of the said period, pertaining to Gandhiji and the Gandhian era like Nandalal Bose, Upendra Maharathi, Ram Kinkar Baij, etc, who too, had expressed themselves on this great event.

This exhibition is a homage and remembrance to Gandhi ji's ideologies of non-violence, and peace and to all those who fought for the sovereignty of this country.


Director's Message


